How is your project linked to the ICOM Strategic Plan 2016-2022?:	The timely theme of migration and building connection through diversity is one that spoke to the contemporary work of our members accross the globe. 25 papers were delivered that enabled ICME members to celebrate international best practice, to share ideas for improving services and communication to diverse audiences (#1 Enhancing membership value through improved participation, service, communications, and capacity building) Participation by the 25 international speakers enhanced ICOM's international profile in these regions. This is most notable in Africa (2 speakers), where ICOM members do not benefit from membership (for example by use of the ICOM card) as widely as their colleagues in Europe, the US and Australia. (#2 Enhancing ICOM's international profile) In addition to the 2016 ICME conference itself ICME helped raise the visibility of ICOM (#3 Raising the visibility of ICOM) and enhanced ICOM's international role (#4 Enhancing ICOM's international role) by publicising the event through its newsletters and listserve (see below). These features of the strategic plan will also be strengthened through publication of the papers in due course.

Outcomes:	ICME demonstrated its relevance to the contemporary museum world through addressing the increasing fear of 'others' around the globe. Specifically ICME speakers noted the innovative ways in which they are working with human beings displaced by war and conflict. Our meetings were filled with hope for humanity hearing presentations about the wide-ranging welcome for refugees nearly arrived in European countries and represented within ethnographic museums.
Please specify:	It was heartening to learn at conference that ICME can widen its services without neglecting its traditional roles of collection care, research and interpretation. Indeed our 2016 meeting demonstrated these traditional roles are enhanced through collaboration and socially engaged practice. Perhaps we can argue that the over-riding value of the ethnographic museum in times of dissent is to build bridges of understanding and community by sharing research and expertise in diverse ways such as through conferences and publications (see below).

Following the election of the new ICME board (2016-19) she is assisted by a wider range of 17 ICME colleagues who submit news items in revolving teams as guest editors. ICME aims to publish 3-4 copies each year.
Date (if applicable):	1. The website was regularly updated, on average bimonthly, by Mario Buletic 2. Facebook was maintained and updated by Sylvia Wackernagel, on average once per week. 3. The ICME Newsletter was edited by Dr Jen Walklate; 3 copies were published in 2016 (April, August, October). The 4th Newsletter, scheduled for December 2016 was postponed to January 2017 so that the new ICOM logo and layout could be properly employed in the new year.

Form of Collaboration (Please specify):	 ICME engaged in a productive collaboration over 2 sessions during the triennial conference on 4.07.2016. ICME members Dr Laurie Kalb and Sylvia Wackernagel made contact with the Ecomuseums group for the first time in 2016. Laurie and Sylvia represented ICME at the Ecomuseums and Community Museums Forum during the 2016 triennial conference. They also attended the ecomuseum tour in the north-west of Milan and maintain contact with a view to developing collaborative projects in the future. Dr Viv Golding worked with Professor Richard Sandell and Dr Vivian Ting to design and deliver a series of workshops for museum curators in Hong Kong University, including liaison and a study trip to the Blue House Hong Kong House of Memories (7-11 January 2016). National Museum of Qatar invited Dr Golding to deliver a series of lectures and workshops on creative programming for diverse audiences (24-28 July;

14-18 August 2016) 5. The Bei Shan Tang Foundation invited Dr Viv Golding to participate in the Forum for Curators of Chinese Art at the Palace Museum Beijing China (13-15 October 2016). This led to a subsequent invitation from the National Museum Nanjing (17 October 2016). 6. The Commonwealth Association of Museums (CAM); ICOM Namibia; ICOM Botswana and ICME worked on issues concerning human remains in South African Musuems (October-December 2016) 7. The Royal Academy of Fine Arts of San Fernando in Madrid invited Sylvia Wackernagel to represent ICOM ICME at the International Museography Congress "The International Museum Conference of 1934 – in perspective" supported by ICOM Spain on the 23 November 2016 where she presented a 30-minute paper on "Particular Problems Posed by Collections of Ethnography". 8. Sylvia Wackernagel liaised with ICOM Pakistan and the Museums Association of Pakistan to explore the development of collaborative activities (training workshops); as part of an ICOM delegation she was invited by the Museums Association of Pakistan to attend Pakistan's first national museum day as honorary guest together with the two ICOM Vice-Presidents Laishun An and Alberto Garlandini as well as the President of the Finnish Museums Association Janne Vilkuna, deliver a presentation at the COMSATS Institute of Information Technology in Sahiwal, visit museums, network with museum professionals and other academics and sign a MOU with the Secretary General of the Museums Association of Pakistan (MAP) Mian Attique Ahmad between the 16 and 19 December 2016. Result(s): 1. ICME and the International Committee for Museums and Collections of Costume have discussed making a collaborative application for ICOM special projects funding. Our committees have a number of members with an educational interest and background that we feel would benefit the development and delivery of workshops. The timeframe of our existing commitments for 2017 mean that this collaborative application may fall in the 2018-19 period. 2. Dr Kalb successfully represented ICME at the Ecomuseums and Community Museums Forum during a round table presentation. Discussions have taken place about future collaborative projects including workshops, but again it is unlikely that any activity will take place before 2018. 3. The sessions delivered at Hong Kong University covered issues of controversy and protest, identity and interpretation, audiences and evaluation, cultures of sense and embodied knowledge(s). Evaluation demonstrated the value of these discursive sessions to museum professionals in the region. 4. Dr Golding welcomed the opportunity to publicise ICME in China. She delivered a session on museum engagement for diverse audiences at the Palace Museum Beijing (14.10.2016) and at the National Museum Nanjing (17.10.2016)5. Dr Golding delivered 10 lectures and workshops outlining best creative practice in museum education to the education and learning team at the National Museum of Qatar in July 2017 (24-28.7.2016). In August she worked closely with the curators and the education team to develop specific resources for 3 of the galleries that will open in 2017 (14-18.8.2016). Her sessions on engagement, learning and programming for diverse audiences covered a

	 range of themes including Learning from objects; Exceptional and Extraordinary Disability Projects notably the House of Memories work at Liverpool; Early Years Programming and Storytelling; Developing Resources and Handling Collections. 6. ICME worked with CAM who submitted a proposal, Promoting Dialogue around Collections of Human Remains in South African Museums to Develop Policy and Guidelines for ICOM Special Project funding (12.12.2016). If successful, ICOM funds will enable ICME to work with CAM; ICOM Namibia and ICOM Botswana on this contentious field of research. 7. Sylvia Wackernagel publicized ICME at an international museum conference in Spain and discussed the outcome of potential future collaborations with ICOM Spain, e.g. newsletter contributions and membership increase of Spanish ICOM members in ICME. 8. Sylvia Wackernagel delivered a lecture representing ICME to museum professionals and institutions in Pakistan at the COMSATS Institute of Communication Technology. She signed a MOU with 3 representatives from the Museums Association of Pakistan and ICOM Pakistan "for the betterment of museums, museology & museum education in Pakistan".

One troublesome factor we have been made aware of is the difficulty that African Museums face with subscriptions and benefits. A detailed investigation into this matter will be conducted through a survey of current and past institutional members in 2017.

Diversity in terms of ethnicity & class was addressed at the ICME conference in Milan during the Genoa & MUDEC meetings. The contact with ecomuseums will enable ICME to tackle diversity from community museum

Favour of Diversity:	perspectives. The ICME Secretary's visit in Spain and Pakistan was especially important considering that ICOM ICME has no members from ICOM Pakistan and very few within ICOM Spain. Religious diversity also lies at the heart of ICME's membership activities. Age diversity was addressed when ICME decided to support 4 ICOM Young Members to participate in Milan 2016. 3 of them were awarded ICME fellowships.
