According to the ICME Rules "the Chairperson shall be elected prior to the other members of the Board. The Chairperson and the other members of the Board shall be elected for three years, and their mandate can be renewed once. A member of the Board may subsequently be elected Chairperson. However, no one may remain on the Board for more than twelve consecutive years. The newly elected Chairperson and the new members of the Board shall choose among themselves specific functions such as Secretary, Treasurer, Newsletter Editor and Webmaster."

Ralf Čeplak Mencin - Slovenia

Museum Counsellor, curator of non-European collections (Asia, Oceania, Australia)

Slovene Ethnographic Museum

Ljubljana, Slovenia



Biography: I was born in 1955 in Ljubljana, Slovenia, where I graduated Ethnology and Psychology. In Zagreb/Croatia I did my MSc in Museology. I have thirty-four years of experience as a curator in different museums (provincial, city, ethnographic) in Slovenia, including eleven years as the head of Ethnographic Museum in Goričane. In 1986 I worked in Namtau Teck Shing Hong NGO in Shenzhen /China.

My research work is focused in the field of Asian studies and Museology. I served two terms as chair of the Museum Association of Slovenia (1991-1993-1995), two terms as chair of the ICOM Slovenia National Committee (1997-2000-2003). I also served three times as a member of the board of ICME (1989-1992, 2007-2010 and 2016-2019) and ICOM - Europe (2002-2007), member of the ICOM Task Force on National Committees and Regional Organizations (2005-2007). In 1991, 1992 and 1993 I was member of the group of experts in the Ministry of Culture in Slovenia. In 1991 I initiated Museoforum, a nonformal museological educational event which is still going on. Since 2003 I am member of the editorial board of National Geographic Junior in Slovenia. I published 180 articles and three books, was co-author of the Museums Guide in Slovenia (1992), was editor of the scinentific periodical Etnolog/The Ethnologist (2012-2015) and organised (was author or co-author) 35 museum exhibitions. In 2009 I initiated »The Romano Chon/Roma month, a cultural festival of the Roma (Gypsy) minority. I was nominated for the member of the ICOM board in the 22nd ICOM General Conference in Shanghai. My last exhibition Afghanistan – Slovene views (2016 – 2017) with an emphasis on the humanitarian and refugee crisis was nominated for the state professional Valvasor museum award, which I won (2006, 2011) already. I have given numerous lectures in Slovenia and abroad (Austria, China, Croatia, France, Germany, Hungary, Peru, Romania). I am a member of several professional associations.

Statement: As a Chair I'll continue to pave the way ICME has done so far and will do my best for the ICME continuation to strive towards a world of respect and appreciation of the tangible and intangible heritage of all Cultures, and the knowledge about it and the possibility to enjoy it should be equally disseminated worldwide. If elected, I would like to put my objectives into practice through my contribution and democratic collaboration with the ICME membership and other ICOM Committees since I have gained experience working on several boards and in the museum field.

Special assistant to the Deputy Director National Museum of the American Indian, Smithsonian Institution

Biography: Martin Earring is an enrolled member of the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe in Eagle Butte, South Dakota. He is the special assistant to the Deputy Director at the National Museum of the American Indian (NMAI) and has worked for the museum since the summer of 2004. Mr. Earring has worn many hats at NMAI, he has been a Visitor Services Representative, Cultural Interpreter, Cultural Information Assistant, and Curatorial research assistant.

Mr. Earring received a MA in Liberal Studies from Dartmouth College as well as BAs in Anthropology and French Studies from the University of South Dakota. Also, Mr. Earring remains actively involved with his tribes serving as a collections management consultant for a tribal visitor center located on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in Kyle, South Dakota, USA.

Statement: Mr. Earring (USA) has been a member of the International Committee for Museums and Collections of Ethnography (ICME) since 2009 and an ICME Board Member since 2013. In ICME/2009, he presented a paper on the importance of indigenous recruitment and retention at the National Museum of the American Indian (NMAI). For ICME/2011, he wrote on challenging antiquated Indigenous American stereotypes through informal museum education and in ICME/2018, he shared about the National Native American Veterans Memorial oral history project.

Mr. Earring was selected for the ICME youth travel fellowships for 2010 and 2011, Shanghai, China and Banz, Germany. In 2017, he hosted a successful annual ICME conference in Washington, DC. During his time as an ICME board member, Mr. Earring raised concerns for the 2015 annual ICME conference slated to be hosted in Kazan, Tatarstan—human rights. During the 2017 annual conference, he created a fellowship sheet for sharing biographical information with ICME membership.

Mr. Earring would like to run for the next Chair of ICME (2019-2022). His goal is to nurture and grow the community, which is one of the long-standing strengths of ICME. Another goal is to expand ICME membership throughout the globe by recruiting and retaining new ICME members, specifically, young museum professionals and peoples of color. Mr. Earring will explore cultural appropriation and sensitivity through an international ethnographic lens. If elected Chair, Mr. Earring will also focus on communications and governance.

She has been conducting and analysing participatory actions in Estonian museums and conducting case study interventions in Estonian National Museum. Her museum exhibitions and research projects also deal with Estonian everyday life from 1980s to nowadays. She is also ICOM Estonia Chair and in many administrative tasks in Estonian museum field.

Jeremy Silvester – Namibia (new)

Director

Museum Associations Namibia

Windhoek, Namibia



Biography: I am the Director of the Museums Association of Namibia (MAN) and a member of ICME and ICOM Namibia. I have worked for MAN since 2005 and prior to that worked as a history lecturer at the University of Namibia for eight years.

I was the Co-ordinator of the Africa Accessioned project, supported by ICOM, that enabled us to start mapping Namibian collections held in European museums, but also enabled us to develop a dialogue on this issue. The project has already helped to initiate important collaborative projects between Namibia and museums in Finland and Germany. The most recent of these has been a mobile exhibition and catalogue entitled *Oombale dhi Ihaka* which has used the small collection of a Finnish missionary collected in the Ondonga Kingdom as a means to reflect on cultural heritage issues in Namibia.

I have also been involved for the last three years in the important debate concerning the issue of Namibian human remains that were unethically collected and held in museums in Germany, Austria, South Africa and elsewhere. The project, supported by ICOM and ICME, seeks to encourage museums in southern Africa to develop its policies and procedures for working with communities concerning the repatriation of unethically collected human remains.

We believe that international collaborations can help release collections (that are, often, stored in cupboards in European museums) as resources that can help develop new ways to preserve and empower cultural memories in Africa. We are currently involved in the planning and early development of a number of new museums in Namibia, including the Museum of Namibian Music, a Museum of Namibian Fashion and the Zambezi Museum (as Namibia's first ecomuseum).

Statement: I believe that the greatest strength of ICME is the international network that it creates and my central goal should be to increase the geographical representation of ICME membership and to find ways to improve the `cross-border' communication between members.

I believe that ICME should play a prominent role in the current debates about decolonizing the museum and that we should develop a strategy that includes strengthening ICME's membership in Africa.

I believe that recent developments present an important opportunity for ethnographic museums with international collections to refashion themselves. I believe that museums should be educational resources and hubs for cultural exchange, drawing on the history of their collections to make new cultural connections.

I believe that ICME should be active in supporting requests for museums to review their collections of human remains and transparent about the provenance of their collection. It is important that ethnographic museums celebrate cultural diversity and promote social harmony and deal with any legacies in their collections that are linked to colonial violence. I believe that the ICME newsletter and social media are important ways to build a real international community and would like to see these strengthened.

I believe that in order to support the new vision of ethnographic museums as hubs for cultural exchange ICME should adopt a new name. I also believe that ICME should seek external funding to support international exchanges at both staff and community level to give substance to its vision.

Rema Zeynalova – Azerbeijan (new)

Biography: Rema Zeynalova is the Chief Specialist of the Azerbaijan Carpet Museum. Rema has worked for the museum since 2006 (Chief Specialist: 2015-present, Senior Researcher: 2008-2015, and Junior Researcher: 2006-2008). Ms Zeynalova's professional interests include public and community engagement, museum communication, dialogue-based and participatory learning.

Currently, Ms Zeynalova conducts a monthly project 'The history of one exhibit' and organizes lectures in the museum. In addition, Ms Zeynalova has experience as a curator in the exhibition dedicated to the poet Nizami Ganjavi's 870th anniversary in New Delhi (India) in 2012 and the exhibition Patterns of Magnificence – Azerbaijani Folk Art in Sofia (Bulgaria) in 2017.

Ms Zeynalova holds the B.A. and M.A. degrees in museum studies from Azerbaijan State University of Culture and Art. In 2017, Rema was awarded with the Honorary Diploma of the President of the Republic of Azerbaijan for the efficient work in the promotion of the art of Azerbaijani carpet weaving. Ms Zeynalova has been a member of ICOM since 2014.

Biography: Dr Peter Ride is the Course Leader for the Masters in Museums, Galleries and Contemporary Culture at the University of Westminster. Educated in Australia (ANU), he has worked in a wide range of museums and arts organisations in the UK with a particular emphasis on photography and digital media, including: the National Museum of Photography Film and TV; the Photographers Gallery; and DA2 Digital Arts Development Agency. His recent academic research is into multi-sensory visitor engagement in museums and looking at the way that digital media and interdisciplinary arts projects are presented within galleries and museums. His practical research also includes research projects addressing cultural engagement in museums in Qatar, and multi-sensory activity and art museums at Tate Modern, London and Jewish family history and identity with the Jewish Museum, London.

Current art based projects include representations of the New Silk Road in Uzbekistan and how Brexit is represented as a cultural phenomenon on social media in the UK. Recent writing includes 'Suspended: Art in the Threshold' in Parry, R. Page, R. & Moseley, M. (eds.) *Museum Thresholds: The Design and Media of Arrival*, Routledge 2018.

Statement: As an academic in Museum Studies I am committed to working with the future generations of museum curators and building an awareness of inclusive and accessible museum practices that address the issues of cultural representation across the museum, from collecting, display to the engagement of visitors. My background is in visual arts and modern history but I work across disciplines particularly aiming to address how cultural knowledge is shared and built on and how museum can benefit from participatory community-based projects.

He earned his master's degree in Museum Studies from Faculty of Tourism and Hotels Management, Helwan University, and published his thesis "Collection Management of Ethnographic Museums: A comparative study between Ethnographic Museum in Cairo and National Museum of Ethnology in Osaka, japan".

In 2012, he earned a diploma of cultural anthropology (two years) from Cairo university, where obtained his bachelor of Archaeology since 2008. In 2015, he attended in comprehensive training course in Ethnographic Museum at the National Museum of Ethnology, Osaka, Japan for 4 months and also attended many international conferences and workshops related with Museology and museum Anthropology like, China, Tunisia, Georgia, USA, Germany, UK, Estonia, and Finland.
